

Lent is a significant season in the year for Christians. It is a time of self-reflection, fasting and giving in preparation for the celebration of Christ's Death and Resurrection at Easter. Lasting for forty days, from Ash Wednesday to the Saturday before Easter, the season draws us towards the light of Christ.

Lent ends with Holy Week. During this sacred week, Christians mark the events leading to Jesus's death on the cross. On Palm Sunday we joyfully wave palms as we remember Jesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The solemnity of Good Friday, the day of Jesus's crucifixion, encourages us to remember that Jesus sacrificed himself on the cross for us. On Easter Sunday we will celebrate the miraculous resurrection of Jesus after his death on the cross.

Everyone is invited to join together at Prairie Spirit as we journey through Lent and Holy Week this year.

Rev. Trisha Gerhard led our worship service a couple of weeks ago. She spoke about how she was called to ministry when she had had a very different idea about her future. 

You will notice a change in our name. This recognizes our new governance that has the Christian Education and Faith Formation mandate within this combined team active since January of 2023.

Lent is soon upon us with Mardi Gras – Shrove Tuesday – on Tuesday February 21<sup>st</sup>, 2023 when traditionally pancakes are served! Some prefer crèpes! But the toppings truly personalize the experience.



## "Why is it called Shrove Tuesday?

It comes from the word 'shrive', which means to give absolution after hearing confession. So Shrove Tuesday is the day when people went to confession to prepare themselves for Lent, which begins on the following day, Ash Wednesday.





It was the last chance for a spot of indulgence before 40 days of fasting, and also an opportunity to use up food that couldn't be eaten during Lent. This included eggs, fat and milk, which were made into pancakes and eaten on that day.

The earliest known English recipe dates from the 15th century, although pancakes had been eaten in other countries for centuries

before that. Ash Wednesday marks the first day of Lent and derives its name from a reference in the book of Daniel


"The practice of Ash Wednesday dates back to the 11th Century," says Lauren F. Winner, a priest and assistant professor at Duke Divinity School. "You see that in the book Daniel in the nine(th) chapter there's a line about associating fasting with ashes, so ashes are associated with penance, which is the dominant theme of Lent."

#### RESPECTFUL COMMUNITY OF FAITH POLICY

Prairie Spirit United Church (PSUC) believes that everyone is entitled to be free from HARASSMENT, DISCRIMINATION and VIOLENCE and is committed to providing a safe and respectful environment for its ministry personnel, employees, congregants, renters and visitors so far as is reasonably practicable.

No one, whether they are ministry personnel, employee, congregant, volunteer, renter or visitor should be subjected to discrimination, harassment, disrespectful or violent behaviour for any reason at any time. No one has the right to discriminate against, harass, show disrespect or violence toward anyone else, while in the building or in any situation related to the activities of Prairie Spirit United Church.
